Public Observing Highlights

It's Skywatch Season!

It's September, and the kids are back in school. This means one thing to NHAS members: it's Skywatch Season!

For those of you who are new at this, the club puts on skywatches for local schools (after sunset, of course) in cooperation with teachers and parents. These events are usually very well-received and a lot of fun. Check our web page at http://www.nhastro.com once in a while to see if there's one in your area that you'd like to attend.

An e-mail goes out to the membership one day before the event, announcing the event, location, time, contact person, and directions.

Generally, a second e-mail goes out by noon on the day of the event, announcing a go/no-go decision. If the second e-mail does not appear, you can assume the event is a "go."

Some general rules apply:

- * Get there early. Ideally, you want to be set up just before the kids start arriving. Setting up during the middle of an event can be hectic; since as soon as the kids see you bringing out equipment, they will swarm around you.
- * Some of these events are quite crowded. Teachers usually do a great job of keeping order, but keep in mind the kids are generally very excited and tend to be a little hyperactive.
- * Keep it simple. If Saturn, Jupiter, or the moon are up, stay with these objects. NGCxxyy or "Otto Struve Double xy" may be fascinating to us, but the kids may not agree (yet!)
- * If you have more than one telescope, bring the less expensive one. Leave your \$300 eyepieces at home.
- * If you have a Newtonian, remind the crowd once every few minutes where you are supposed to look. This keeps kids from scraping the ground as they try to look through the back of your scope.
- * If you must use a stepstool or ladder, ask the kid to put his/her hand on your shoulder while they look, or gently steady them with your hands. Kids have a tendency to topple over while up in the air with one or both eyes closed.

Remember, these are your events. The kids and teachers look to you for guidance and supervision. Many people remark that these skywatches are the most rewarding parts of being an NHAS member (there is nothing like hearing the excitement of a kid seeing Saturn for the first time.) We need your telescopes and your expertise, so brush up on your finding skills and I'll see you out there!
